AIR FORCE ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE CENTER (AFAFC)

Established as Air Force Finance Division and organized as a separate operating agency, 1 January 1951; redesignated Air Force Accounting and Finance Division, 1 September 1957; redesignated Air Force Accounting and Finance Center, 1 July 1959.

AIR FORCE AUDIT AGENCY (AFAA)

Constituted as Air Force Audit Agency and activated as a separate operating agency, 31 December 1971.

AIR FORCE COMMUNICATIONS SERVICE (AFCS)

Constituted as Army Airways Communications System Wing, 13 April 1943; activated as part of Flight Control Command, 26 April 1943; reassigned directly to Army Air Forces, 14 July 1943; redesignated Army Airways Communications System, 26 April 1944; redesignated Air Communications Service and reassigned to Air Transport Command, 13 March 1946; redesignated Airways and Air Communications Service, 11 September 1946; reassigned to Military Air Transport Service, 1 June 1948; relieved from assignment to Military Air Transport Service, elevated to a major command, and redesignated Air Force Communications Service, 1 July 1961.

AIR FORCE DATA AUTOMATION AGENCY (AFDAA)

Constituted as Air Force Data Automation Agency and activated as a separate operating agency, 29 February 1972.

AIR FORCE INSPECTION AND SAFETY CENTER (AFISC)

Constituted as Air Force Intelligence Service and activated as a separate operating agency, 27 June 1972.

Established as Army Air Forces Materiel and Services, 14 July 1944; organized as a major command, 17 July 1944; redesignated Army Air Forces Air Technical Service Command, 31 August 1944; redesignated Air Technical Service Command, 1 July 1945; redesignated Air Materiel Command, 9 March 1946; redesignated Air Force Logistics Command, 1 April 1961.

AIR FORCE MILITARY PERSONNEL CENTER (AFMPC)

Constituted as Air Force Military Personnel Center and activated as a separate operating agency, 31 December 1971.

AIR FORCE OFFICE OF SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS (AFOSI)

Constituted as Air Force Office of Special Investigations and activated as a separate operating agency, 31 December 1971.

AIR FORCE RESERVE (AFRES)

Constituted as Air Force Reserve and activated as a separate operating agency, 21 June 1968; organized, 1 August 1968.

AIR FORCE SYSTEMS COMMAND (AFSC)

Established as Research and Development Command, 23 January 1950; organized as a major command, 1 February 1950; redesignated Air Research and Development Command, 16 September 1950; redesignated Air Force Systems Command, 1 April 1961.

AIR FORCE TEST AND EVALUATION CENTER (AFTEC)

Constituted as Air Force Test and Evaluation Center and activated as a separate operating agency, 1 January 1974.

AIR RESERVE PERSONNEL CENTER (ARPC)

Constituted as Air Reserve Records Center, 30 November 1956; activated as part of Continental Air Command, 1 January 1957; redesignated Air Reserve Personnel Center, 1 September 1965; made a separate operating agency, 1 August 1968.

AIR TRAINING COMMAND (ATC)

Established as a major command under designation Air Corps Flying Training Command, 23 January 1942; redesignated Army Air Forces Flying Training Command, March 1942; redesignated Army Air Forces Training Command, 31 July 1943; redesignated Air Training Command, 1 July 1946.

AIR UNIVERSITY (AU)

Established as Air Service School, 1920; redesignated Air Service Field Officers' School, 10 February 1921; redesignated Air Service Tactical School, 8 November 1922; redesignated Air Corps Tactical School, 18 August 1926; discontinued, 9 October 1942; reestablished as Army Air Forces School of Applied Tactics and assigned to Army Air Forces Center, 16 October 1943; redesignated Army Air Forces School, 1 June 1945; reassigned directly to Army Air Forces and given status of major command, 29 November 1945; redesignated Air University, 12 March 1946.

Established, 27 July 1954; activated as a separate operating agency, 14 August 1954.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCE SECURITY SERVICE (USAFSS)

Established, 20 October 1948; organized as a major command, 26 October 1948.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCES IN EUROPE (USAFE)

Constituted as Eighth Air Force, 19 January 1942; activated as a major command, 28 January 1942; redesignated United States Strategic Air Forces in Europe, 22 February 1944; redesignated United States Air Forces in Europe, 7 August 1945.

UNITED STATES AIR FORCES SOUTHERN COMMAND (USAFSO)

Constituted as Panama Canal Air Force, 19 October 1940; activated as a major command, 20 November 1940; redesignated Caribbean Air Force, 5 August 1941; redesignated Sixth Air Force, 5 February 1942; redesignated Caribbean Air Command, 31 July 1946; redesignated United States Air Forces Southern Command, 8 July 1965.







SECOND HALF, FY 73

3 Jan	A Strategic Air Command (SAC) B-52D based at U-Tapao Airfield, Thailand was damaged by a North Vietnamese (NVN) SA-2 surface-to-air missile while over target near Vinh, NVN. The crew subsequently ejected over water near the DMZ. The six crew members were successfully recovered by SAR forces.
16 Jan	PACAF requested an additional ECM capability in SEAsia to counter the possible introduction of the SA-3 in NVN. In June 1972, 125 ALQ-119 ECM pods were designated for deployment to PACAF in view of the possible introduction of the SA-4 into the NVN air defense system. Fifty of these pods were deployed. Recent photography has confirmed SA-3 sites in NVN. There is a possibility that additional SA-3s could be introduced in SEAsia including Laos. Therefore, USAFE is being tasked to deploy the additional 75 pods, four sets of operational AGE, and 20 ALQ-119 maintenance personnel on receipt of shipping instructions from PACAF.
27 Jan	SAC B-52 forces (ARC LIGHT), conducting air strikes in South Vietnam (SVN) continuously since June 1965, ceased strike operations in all areas of SEAsia except Laos. Termination was effective 27/2359Z (1859 EST) January 1973. The last aircraft cell time over on SVN target (TOT) was 27/1828 (EST) in Military Region II.
27 Jan	SAC B-52G aircraft operating from Andersen AFB, Guam in support of psychological warfare operations in SEAsia were terminated effective 27/2359Z Jan 73.
28 Jan	B-52 strike sorties (ARC LIGHT) were decreased from the 3150 per month rate to a commitment of approximately 900 per month. Assets remained in theater for an immediate return to the 3150 monthly level.
Jan	Transfer of the last ten EC-47 airborne radio direction finding (ARDF) aircraft to the VNAF has been delayed until 18 February. Although reassignment of all 30 aircraft was reported during November 1972, the USAF has continued to operate the last ten out of Da Nang to assist in coverage during the Vietnamization of the EC-47s. The remaining 23 EC-47s assigned to the USAF are now operating out of Nakhon Phanom and Ubon, Thailand.
28 Jan	The Guam based Strategic Air Command B-52 crews deployed for ARC LIGHT operations began qualification training flights for recurrency in SIOP requirements.
3 Feb	B-52 strike effort (ARC LIGHT) in Laos was increased to approximately 50 sorties per day.
4 Feb	An EC-47Q (SN 48636) assigned to Nakhon Phanom, Thailand, was lost to unknown causes while flying an airborne radio direction finding mission in Laos. The aircrew had previously reported encountering 23/37 MM antiaircraft fire and the wreckage was located in an area where these defenses were evident (015-37N 107-OOE). There are now seven ALR-38 equipped EC-47 aircraft in the USAF inventory. There are an additional fifteen ALR-35 equipped EC-47s; three of these are Q series aircraft. All USAF EC-47s are stationed at Nakhon Phanom and Ubon, Thailand.
10 Feb	ARC LIGHT effort in Laos again increased up to approximately 60 sorties per day.
11 Feb	B-52 strike sorties in Laos were increased to the maximum feasible number. This authority continued in effect until the effective date of Laotian cease fire.
21 Feb	Strategic Air Command B-52 forces (ARC LIGHT) ceased strike operations in Laos. Strikes in SEAsia countries other than Laos had previously been terminated. The Laotian ceasefire for ARC LIGHT was effective at 2400 EST on 21 Feb 1973. The last cell time over target (TOT) was 21/2250 EST in the Barrel Roll area.
24 Feb	The EB-66 aircraft at Korat were restricted from flight by the wing commander. This resulted from an EB-66 crash of 23 Dec 72 (caused from engine failure) and three additional in-flight engine shutdowns during February. The 388 TFW is conducting an investigation of the engines/electrical system and AFLC is sending an engineering team to Korat to assist in the investigation.
23 Feb	Strategic Air Command B-52 forces (ARC LIGHT) were authorized to resume air strikes in Cambodia.
1 Mar	The first VNAF AC-119K operational loss occurred when Da Nang weather and insufficient fuel forced a bail-out of five USAF instructors and seven VNAF students. There was one VNAF fatality.
13 Mar	B-52 ARC LIGHT strike effort in Cambodia was increased to a daily sustained rate of 50-60 sorties.
17 Mar	The last two air bases maintained in support of USAF combat operations in South Vietnam were relinquished to the control of the Republic of South Vietnam. USAF control of Da Nang Airfield was terminated on 17 March 1973 and the remaining USAF personnel departed Tan Son Nhut Air Base on 29 March 1973.
24 Mar	After several test missions without weapons, ARC LIGHT FORCES began bomb releases in Cambodia with F-4 PAVE PHANTOM PATHFINDER aircraft (LORAN) leading the B-52 cells to the bomb release point. Lacking sufficient LORAN equipped B-52s, this was necessary in some areas where adequate MSQ coverage or suitable geographical offset aiming points were not available.
Mar	7AF HQ completed the move from Tan Son Nhut Air Base, Vietnam to Nakhon Phanom Airport, Thailand in March 1973.
15 Apr	B-52 ARC LIGHT strikes were resumed on a specific target area in Laos at the urgent request of the Laotian government.
16 Apr	B-52 ARC LIGHT strikes initiated on 15 Apr 73 in Laos were terminated.
22 Apr	B-52 ARC LIGHT strike effort in Cambodia was increased to a daily rate of 81 sorties.



PART II

INTRODUCTION

THE CONTENTS OF THIS SECTION PRESENT STATISTICS OF AIRCRAFT ACCIDENTS WHICH OCCURRED IN THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE THE AIR NATIONAL GUARD, AND THE AIR FORCE RESERVE.

ALL RATES ARE EXPRESSED IN NUMBER OF ACCIDENTS PER 100,000 FLYING HOURS.

FINAL CHANGES TO AIRCRAFT ACCIDENT STATISTICS EXTEND OVER A PERIOD OF SEVERAL MONTHS. THIS DATA IS SUBJECT TO CHANGES DURING FINAL EVALUATION.

DEFINITIONS

FATAL ACCIDENT - ANY MAJOR OR MINOR FLIGHT ACCIDENT IN WHICH ONE OR MORE PERSONS SUSTAIN FATAL INJURIES.

FLIGHT ACCIDENT - A MISHAP WHICH RESULTS IN DAMAGE TO, OR DESTRUCTION OF ONE OR MORE USAF AIRCRAFT WHEN INTENT FOR FLIGHT EXISTS. INTENT FOR FLIGHT IS CONSIDERED TO EXIST WHEN THE ENGINE IS STARTED FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMMENCING FLIGHT; IT CONTINUES UNTIL THE AIRCRAFT COMES TO REST WITH THE ENGINE(S), PROPELLER(S) OR ROTOR(S) STOPPED AND THE BRAKES SET OR WHEEL CHOCKS IN PLACE.

MAJOR ACCIDENT - A MAJOR ACCIDENT IS ONE IN WHICH THE AIRCRAFT IS DESTROYED OR IS SUBSTANTIALLY DAMAGED (SEE AFR 127-4).

MINOR ACCIDENT - A MINOR ACCIDENT IS ONE IN WHICH THE AIRCRAFT RECEIVES MINOR DAMAGE AS DEFINED IN AFR 127-4.

ALL OR TOTAL ACCIDENTS - TOTAL OF MAJOR AND MINOR ACCIDENTS.

INTRODUCTION

THE CONTENTS OF THIS SECTION ARE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE GROUND ACCIDENT STATISTICS. ACCIDENTS OF THE INACTIVE AIR FORCE RESERVE AND THE AIR NATIONAL GUARD ARE NOT INCLUDED.

DEFINITIONS

ACCIDENT, GROUND - ANY ACCIDENT, WHICH OCCURS ON OR OFF AN AIR FORCE INSTALLATION, BASE, OR SITE, WHICH INVOLVES AIR FORCE MILITARY PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE CIVILIAN PERSONNEL ON DUTY, OR AIR FORCE PROPERTY. (SEE AFR 127-4)

ACCIDENT, PRIVATE MOTOR VEHICLE - A MOTOR VEHICLE ACCIDENT INVOLVING ONLY NON-AIR FORCE MOTOR VEHICLES, OR, IF BOTH AIR FORCE AND NON-AIR FORCE VEHICLES WERE INVOLVED, THE AIR FORCE MOTOR VEHICLE WAS NOT BEING OPERATED AT THE TIME OF THE ACCIDENT. DISABLING INJURY TO A USAF PERSON IS A REQUISITE OF THIS CLASSIFICATION. (SEE AFR 127-4)

ACCIDENT, USAF (GOVERNMENT) MOTOR VEHICLES - AN ACCIDENT INVOLVING THE OPERATION OF AN AIR FORCE MOTOR VEHICLE WHICH RESULTS IN INJURY TO USAF OR NON-USAF PERSONS OR DAMAGE TO VEHICLES OR PROPERTY WITHOUT REGARD TO OWNERSHIP. (SEE AFR 127-4)

INJURY, DISABLING - AN INJURY WHICH RESULTS IN DEATH, PERMANENT TOTAL, PERMANENT PARTIAL, OR TEMPORARY TOTAL CONDITION WHICH, IN THE OPINION OF A MEDICAL AUTHORITY, MAKES IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR THE INJURED TO RETURN TO DUTY AT ANY TIME DURING THE CALENDAR DAY FOLLOWING THE DAY OF INJURY.

RATES - ALL RATES ARE EXPRESSED IN NUMBER OF INJURIES OR ACCIDENTS PER 1,000,000 UNITS OF EXPOSURE. UNITS OF EXPOSURE ARE MANDAYS FOR MILITARY PERSONNEL, MANHOURS FOR CIVILIAN PERSONNEL AND MILES FOR GOVERNMENT MOTOR VEHICLES.

Information included in this section provides data pertaining to procurement and production of aircraft and missiles for the USAF, Military Assistance-Service Funded (MASF), Foreign Military Sales (FMS), Military Assistance Program (Grant Aid), and other Services/Agencies, during Fiscal Year 1974.

The aircraft and missile tables reflect the procurement programs, by fiscal year funding, for FY 1972 and prior, FY 1973, and FY 1974. The tables also reflect quantities accepted, by month, during Fiscal Year 1974.

Production data for aircraft and missiles are obtained under the provisions of AF Regulation 84-8, dated 28 March 1968. Procurement data, by FY Funding, are obtained from the WA and WM Aircraft and Missiles Production Planning Schedules, as changed by Procurement Authorizations issued by Headquarters USAF/RDGB.

DEFINITIONS

MISSION/DESIGN/SERIES - Air Force Regulation 82-1, dated 27 March 1974, Designating and Naming Defense Equipment (Military Aircraft, Rockets, and Guided Missiles) establishes a uniform system for designating and naming military aircraft and missiles. DOD Directive 4120.15-L, 15 April 1974, Model Designation of Military Aircraft, Rockets and Guided Missiles, lists the current designation for each of these aerospace vehicles.

ACCEPTANCE - Aircraft, missile or drone which has been shop-assembled and fully inspected by constituted USAF, Navy or Army production authorities, and for which the title, responsibility, and accountability has been assumed by the contracting agency of the recipient.

AIRCRAFT - A heavier-than-air vehicle, designed primarily for flight in the atmosphere, which has incorporated in its prime design the ability and/or requirement for human occupancy.

DRONE - Any aircraft or missile modified or produced to perform the mission of a target for weapon evaluation or crew training, or for reconnaissance, and has incorporated into its prime design the ability to be flown by remote control.

GUIDED MISSILE - Unmanned, self-propelled vehicle designed to move in a trajectory or flight path all or partially above the earth's surface and whose trajectory or course, while the vehicle is in motion, is capable of being controlled remotely or by homing systems, or by inertial and/or programmed guidance from within. This term does not include space vehicles, space boosters, or Naval torpedoes, but it does include target and reconnaissance drones.





MILITARY CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

INTRODUCTION

This section reflects progress of the Military Construction Program, since its inception in the Air Force, in terms of dollars available, apportioned, contracted, etc. Most of the data were furnished by the Directorate of Budget and the Directorate of Civil Engineering.

DEFINITIONS

APPROVED PROGRAM - Scope and dollar amount approved for implementation of construction and funding by appropriate authority of Office of the Secretary of Defense and/or Bureau of the Budget through apportionment, or program clearance.

AUTHORIZED PROGRAM - The USAF Military Construction Program as approved by Congress.

CURRENT PROGRAM - The scope and dollar amount deemed necessary for the completion of a line item determined essential to the mission of the USAF.

OPERATING PROGRAM - The scope and dollar amount released to USAF construction agencies as approved for construction, obligation, and expenditures for the completion of a line item.

REAL PROPERTY INVENTORY

INTRODUCTION

These tables present the real property (facilities and land) controlled by the Air Force. The costs shown represent the costs at time of acquisition to the U.S. Government, plus any subsequent improvement, and do not reflect the current value or estimated replacement costs.

DEFINITIONS

EASEMENTS - A right which one party has to use the land owned by another party for ingress and egress, or for the purpose of reducing or limiting the height of objects on land owned by another party to establish security or safety area, or right-of-way interests.

FOREIGN RIGHTS - An agreement or contract between the U.S. Government and a foreign country which gives the United States the right to use the land in a foreign country.

LEASES - A contract between a lessor and a lessee granting exclusive possessory interest in real property for a specified term, reserving to the owner rent or other consideration.

LICENSE - A privilege, revocable at will, to use or pass over privately owned real property for a specified purpose.

OWNED LAND - Land acquired through donation, condemnation, or purchase.

PUBLIC DOMAIN AND PUBLIC LAND - Land assigned to the AF through a permanent or temporary withdrawal from public domain.

COST OF MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF REAL PROPERTY

INTRODUCTION

This section shows the cost of maintenance and operation of USAF Real Property.

DEFINITIONS

CONTRACT - Lump sum and unit price work agreements administered by the installation for preservation and construction; and utility service, inspection, and maintenance agreements administered by major Air Force command headquarters.

LABOR COSTS - Costs of all personnel, regardless of the source, performing work attributable to real estate facility activities. The rates used in costing military services are those prescribed in AFM 177-1.

MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES - For use in accomplishing the functions of maintenance, repair, and operation of real estate facilities.

STORAGE SPACE UTILIZATION AND OCCUPANCY

INTRODUCTION

The reporting of storage space utilization and occupancy within the Air Force has been revised under the guidance of Office of the Secretary of Defense to provide a uniform procedure for all services. Included in the summary are all Air Force depots.

DEFINITIONS

GROSS STORAGE SPACE - The gross area (regardless of its location or the purpose for which the space being used was designed or is designated) which is assigned or used for any operation concerning storage or the support of storage functions.

NET STORAGE SPACE - The floor area upon which bins are erected plus the floor area upon which material can be stored.

OPEN STORAGE SPACE - Any improved or unimproved area designated for use in storing material.

WAREHOUSE SPACE - The area in building designed for storage purposes and constructed with roof and complete side and end walls.



DEFINITIONS

ARMED FORCES QUALIFICATION TEST MENTAL GROUP: An airman's mental ability level as determined from his score on the Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT).

AIR FORCE NATIONAL GUARD AIR ALERT PILOTS: Officers of the Air Force National Guard who are authorized to and augment active Air Force Units for short periods of active duty to perform air alert duty.

ARMED FORCES QUALIFICATION TEST SCORE (AFQT SCORE): The test contains questions on arithmetical reasoning, word knowledge, tool functions, and spatial visualization. The "Score" is a composite index of performance on all these items, and as such, is an indication of general learning ability.

CHARGEABLE MILITARY PERSONNEL:

1. All USAF Military Personnel on Extended Active Duty who are authorized and assigned to active Air Force Units against position spaces which are chargeable against USAF Authorized Manpower Ceilings.
2. USAF Academy Cadets.
3. Air Force National Guard Air Alert Pilots.

MILITARY STRENGTH BY COMMAND: All USAF Military Personnel (Permanent Party and Pipeline) who are assigned to active Air Force Units. This strength is composed of individuals, regardless of chargeability to military personnel ceilings, who as individuals are under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Air Force.

STRENGTH BY OPERATING LOCATION: A permanent duty station of an individual or a detachment of a unit other than the permanent station of the unit. A station is considered permanent if the orders specify a period of three months or longer. If no period is specified, the duty station is considered permanent.

DEPARTMENTAL STATUS: The basic department of the Department of Defense in which an individual is currently commissioned, appointed or enlisted, regardless of whether or not such individual has been placed on duty with another of the departments.

DEPARTMENT OF AIR FORCE PERSONNEL: Military Personnel who have been commissioned, appointed, enlisted, or recalled in the United States Air Force.

FIRST TERM AIRMEN: A Regular Air Force Airman with no prior military services, serving on his first enlistment in the United States Air Force.

INTERNAL TURNOVER: The number of permanent change of station movements of military personnel as individuals exclusive of accessions and separations movements.

NATIONAL HEALTH, SAFETY, OR INTEREST: Personnel separated under provisions of Sec III, AFR 36-22 and Chapter 3, Section B, AFR 39-10.

MILITARY PERSONNEL (CONTINUED)

NON-CHARGEABLE MILITARY PERSONNEL: All Military Personnel on Extended Active Duty who are authorized and assigned to active Air Force Units against position spaces which are in addition to and not chargeable against USAF Authorized Manpower Ceilings.

PERMANENT PARTY PERSONNEL: Those USAF personnel assigned to an Air Force Unit to perform their principal duty in the furtherance of the mission of the unit, and who are chargeable against the specific authorizations of the unit. This includes assigned overstrength.

PIPELINE PERSONNEL: Those USAF Personnel who are assigned to an Air Force Unit temporarily for the purpose of training or hospitalization i.e., those who are temporarily ineffective. Such personnel are not chargeable against the specific authorizations of the unit to which they are assigned while in a pipeline status. Pipeline is composed of students and patients.

Patients: Military personnel assigned in patient status to an Air Force Unit which administers Air Force hospitalized personnel receiving treatment at a medical facility operated by any of the three military departments.

Students: Personnel assigned in a training status to a unit charged with administration of individuals attending a formal course of instruction at a service or civilian school or a base military training course.

PRIOR SERVICE ENLISTMENTS:

1. Former regular airman who had served a continuous period of duty.
2. Former Commissioned or Warrant Officer who had been separated from the Air Force and who had enlisted in the Regular Air Force as an airman.
3. Former enlistee or inductee of the Army or the Navy who had served on active military service for a continuous period.
4. Former enlisted members of a reserve component of the Air Force who have served on active military service.

REENLISTMENT: Airmen who enlist in the Regular Air Force for their own duty position within 90 days after separation from active Air Force duty. This applies to first term and career airmen.

REGULAR AIR FORCE PERSONNEL: Department of the Air Force Military Personnel who by enlistment, appointment, or commission, are members of the Regular Air Force.

RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS (ROTC): A training corps with units established at civilian educational institutions to qualify students for appointment as reserve officers.

UNIT MANNING VARIANCES: The difference between the number of spaces authorized to a unit and the number of personnel assigned to the unit.

USAF CADET: U.S. Air Force Academy Cadet. USAFA Cadets are not assigned to active organized Air Force Units. Students are assigned to the USAF Academy for training and ultimate commissioning as Regular Air Force officers. These personnel are not considered part of active forces but are chargeable to the active force ceiling.



DEFINITIONS

ADMISSION - When applied to: (1) Active duty military personnel, the term indicates that the individual has been placed under treatment as a quarters patient or as a hospital bed occupant on an excused-from-duty basis. (2) A civilian patient, the term indicates that a patient has entered a hospital as a bed occupant, for some form of treatment.

ADMISSION RATE - The admission rate is a measure which indicates the frequency with which military patients are excused from duty for medical reasons. Hence, the admission rate is based on admissions from duty. These are annual admission rates, which show the number of admissions that would occur during a 365 day year if admissions occurred throughout an entire year at the same frequency as in the period of observation. The annual admission rate per thousand average strength is computed as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of admissions during the period} \times \text{Number of such periods in a year} \times 1,000}{\text{Mean strength during the period}}$$

AIR FORCE PERSONNEL - Air Force military personnel on active duty, not including Air Force Academy cadets or personnel on active duty for training.

AVERAGE OCCUPIED BEDS - The average of the numbers of patients occupying beds in hospitals as of midnight of each day in the period.

COMPLETE PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS - Complete physical examinations include only those recorded on the Report of Medical Examination (Standard Form 88); physical inspections of food handlers or barbers are not included nor are examinations of personnel who are ill.

HOSPITALIZED RATIO - The hospitalized ratio is the weighted average of the proportions of strength in an inpatient status each day (of the period for which it is computed). It differs from the noneffective ratio in that it includes only bed occupancy days in hospitals. The ratio is computed per 100 strength as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of bed occupancy days in the period} \times 100}{\text{Mean strength} \times \text{Number of calendar days in the period}}$$

INPATIENT ADMISSION - The enrollment of a patient for care on the wards of a hospital.

NONEFFECTIVE RATIO - The medical noneffective ratio is the weighted average of the proportions of strength not available for duty, for medical reasons, each day (of the period for which it is computed). Such persons may be under treatment as inpatients, in quarters, on sick leave, or AWOL from a patient status. The ratio is computed for a specified period, per 100 strength as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of sick days in period} \times 100}{\text{Mean strength} \times \text{Number of calendar days in the period}}$$

OPERATING BEDS - This term applies to beds with staff and equipment ready for treatment of patients in hospitals.

OUTPATIENT VISITS - One visit is counted each time an outpatient or quarters patient received advice and/or treatment at an organized clinic or specialty service. More than one visit per patient may be counted on a given day.

PHYSIOLOGICAL TRAINING - Program of instruction to familiarize the flyer with the physiological and psychological stresses of modern military aviation and space flight, and to prepare him to meet these stresses successfully. Physiological training officers are also responsible for training air crew members in functions of personnel protective equipment which is used in flight, escape from aircraft, and survival.





INTRODUCTION

Information is collected semiannually for use in managing the Air Force Correction Program and is derived from reports required by AFR 125-17.

DEFINITIONS

DETENTION FACILITY - This facility services one base. Because of space and manpower limitations, casual prisoners from other services are usually not accepted for confinement.

CONSOLIDATED DETENTION FACILITY - This facility services more than one base in a geographical area and is used to confine Air Force casual, pretrial, adjudged, and sentenced prisoners who do not meet the criteria for transfer to the 3320th Retraining Group or the United States Disciplinary Barracks. Other service casual, pretrial, adjudged, and sentenced prisoners may be confined, by appropriate written agreement, providing the other service assigns personnel commensurate with their average daily prisoner load.

CORRECTIONAL CUSTODY - The physical restraint of a person imposed as a punishment under Article 15, UCMJ. (MCM, 1969)

CASUAL STATUS - A prisoner held at a Detention or Consolidated Detention facility awaiting disposition instructions or transfer arrangements.

DEFINITIONS

CASE TYPE - The numerical designation and descriptive character assigned to each investigation which indicates the principal nature or the purpose of the investigation.

COUNTERINTELLIGENCE INVESTIGATIONS - Investigations conducted to determine facts related to security control measures designed to insure the safeguarding of information, personnel, equipment, and installations against the sabotage, espionage, or subversive activities of foreign powers and of disaffected or dissident groups or individuals which may constitute a threat to the internal security of the Air Force.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS - Investigations conducted to determine facts and circumstances pertaining to alleged major violations of the Articles of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Federal Statutes, and/or other applicable directives, by USAF personnel, excluding incidents of a counterintelligence or procurement nature.


FRAUD INVESTIGATIONS - Investigations conducted to determine facts surrounding incidents of alleged breaches of the public trust and violations of law in connection with Air Force procurement, disposal, nonappropriated funds, and pay and allowance matters.

PERSONNEL SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS - Investigations consisting, principally, of local agency checks which serve as a basis for granting base access, reciprocal investigations conducted for other agencies (primarily, the Defense Investigative Service) in overseas areas and premarital investigations of intended alien spouses of Air Force military personnel.

THE JUDGE ADVOCATE GENERAL



INTRODUCTION

The Office of The Judge Advocate General provides statistical data reflecting punishment of members for offenses against military law. The statistics are derived from AF Form 214, "Court-Martial and Article 15 Activities Report", AFR 111-3, submitted quarterly by each major command exercising general court-martial jurisdiction.

Table 94 is a summarized report by quarter of court-martial activities reflecting the number of military persons subject to court-martial jurisdiction pursuant to the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Article 2; number tried by type of court; over-all rates per 1000 average assigned and attached military strength; number of convictions and acquittals; number of trials; average elapsed days per trial; and number of punitive discharges adjudged and approved by the general court-martial convening authority.

Table 95 reflects, by command, the number of military persons subject to court-martial jurisdiction; number of persons tried by type of court; rates per 1000 average assigned and attached military strength; and number and rates per 1000 for those persons receiving nonjudicial punishment pursuant to the UCMJ, Article 15.

Table 96 provides, by command, the number of nonjudicial punishment actions by grade; and the types of punishment imposed.

DEFINITIONS

General Court-Martial - A general court-martial may adjudge a dishonorable or bad conduct discharge as part of the sentence.

Special (BCD) Court-Martial - A special court-martial which adjudges a bad conduct discharge as part of the sentence.

Special (non-BCD) Court-Martial - A special court-martial which does not adjudge a discharge as part of the sentence, but may adjudge as much as six months confinement.

Summary Court-Martial - A summary court-martial may not adjudge a discharge or confinement in excess of 30 days.

Nonjudicial Punishment - Punishment imposed by a commanding officer for minor offenses without the intervention of a court-martial, which does not become a permanent part of the offender's military record.

INTRODUCTION

The Air Force Reserve personnel statistical data contained in this section pertains to those reservists not on extended active duty (EAD). These statistical tables are designed to show the composition and characteristics of Air Force Reserve personnel and reflect the strengths, grades, and gains and losses at specific intervals throughout the fiscal year.

In general, the definitions contained herein have been taken from, or are in conformity to, the definitions included in the Air Force Regulations 45 series and Air Force Regulation 35-41.

DEFINITIONS

ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING - A tour of active duty (AD) reserve training under orders which provide for automatic reversion to the USAFR not on AD when the specified period of AD is completed.

ACTIVE DUTY FOR PAY ONLY - Reservists assigned to Reserve Sections in which they are paid only for their active duty for training tours. They may participate in active duty drill training for points only.

DRILL PAY STATUS RESERVISTS - Reservists assigned to Reserve Sections in which they are authorized to receive pay for inactive and active duty for training performed.

INACTIVE DUTY TRAINING - Training performed by a USAFR member while not on AD for which pay and point credit may be authorized.

MILITARY SERVICE OBLIGATION (MSO) - The period that an individual must serve as a member of a Regular and/or Reserve component of the Armed Services required by law.

OBLIGOR - A member of the Air Force Reserve who has an MSO.

NONOBLIGOR - A member of the Air Force Reserve who does not have an MSO.

MOBILIZATION AUGMENTEE - Generally, a Ready Reserve member assigned to a Regular AF unit against an individual manpower authorization established to support the period immediately following a declaration of war or national emergency, or to respond to any situation that the national security requires. Mobilization augmentees in the Reserve Supplement Officer Program are assigned against a pool AFSC requirement.

OBLIGATED RESERVE SECTION (ORS) - The ORS is an active status section of the Ready Reserve. A Ready Reserve member with an MSO or a direct appointee in the USAFR whose appointment is contingent on his serving an EAD tour (with or without an MSO) who is not voluntarily or mandatorily assigned to a Ready Reserve unit or mobilization augmentation position will be assigned to the ORS.

READY RESERVE - The Ready Reserve consists of units and members of the USAFR, liable for involuntary order to EAD in time of war or national emergency declared by the President, Congress, or when otherwise authorized by law.

STANDBY RESERVE - The Standby Reserve consists of the Nonaffiliated Reserve Section and the Inactive Status List Reserve Section assigned to and administered by ARPC. Members may only be ordered to EAD in time of war or a national emergency declared by Congress.

RETIRED STATUS - The status of a USAFR member who, on the basis of law, has been determined eligible for retirement with or without pay and who is assigned upon his request or by law to the Retired Reserve.

NONPRIOR SERVICE PERSONNEL - Members who have no prior status as a member of any other armed service including any Reserve component. They are subject to the initial active duty training tour for a minimum of four months.

REINFORCEMENT DESIGNEES - A Ready Reserve member assigned to an Air Reserve Squadron, the Ready Reenforcement Personnel Section, or the Obligated Reserve Section. These members represent a pool resource providing the Air Force with an added manning capability for needs which can be anticipated but which cannot be precisely established by grade and AFSC. They are in non-pay status.

RESERVE OFFICER REPRESENTATION ON AIR FORCE STAFFS - The Statutory authority for these personnel is contained in Sections 265, 672(d), 8019 and 8033(e), Title 10, USC.

RESERVE SECTION - Classification of Reservists by type, amount of training and pay authorized, and/or type of unit or categories of assignment.

The calendar age of active aircraft increased over the last several fiscal years. In FY 1964, for example, 34% of the fleet was over 9 years old. This percentage steadily increased until, in FY 1969, it peaked at 58%. Beginning in FY 1970, expenditure and force reductions removed older aircraft from the active inventory.

As of the beginning of FY 1974, the number of aircraft over 9 years old equated to 53% of the total fleet. This percentage, at the end of FY 1974, is 55%.

INTRODUCTION

This section reflects the funding operations of the various Air Force appropriations and/or funds with the respective major programs for the fiscal years indicated in the title of each table.

EXPLANATION OF TERMS

APPROPRIATION - An authorization by an Act of Congress to incur obligations for specified purposes and to make payments therefore out of the Treasury.

APPROPRIATION ACCOUNT - An account established to make amounts available for obligation and expenditure from the Treasury. Appropriation accounts include not only accounts to which money is appropriated, but also revolving funds, working funds, trust funds, etc. Appropriation accounts do not include official deposit funds.

APPROPRIATION REIMBURSEMENT - Amounts collected or to be collected for commodities, work or services furnished or to be furnished to another appropriation or fund or to an individual, firm or corporation which by law may be credited to an appropriation or fund account. Amounts to be collected include accounts receivable, reimbursements earned but not billed and amounts anticipated for the remainder of the year. They may also include inter-agency orders accepted and on hand for which delivery has not been made to the extent that this order is a valid obligation of this ordering agency and the collection will be credited to the appropriation being reported.

BUDGET PROGRAM - A subdivision established under an appropriation to identify a significant segment of Air Force operations.

DISBURSEMENT - The amount of expenditure checks issued and cash payments made, net of refunds received. Disbursements include all advances.

EXPENDITURE - Payment of obligations.

OUTLAY - Gross payments less reimbursements, refunds, and loan repayments received and credited to the appropriation or fund account. Consists of "expenditures" and "net lending". The terms "outlay" and "expenditures" are virtually synonymous for the Air Force, since the only difference is a relatively insignificant amount of "net lending".

FUND - A sum of money or other resource authorized by law to be set aside and to be used or expended only for specified purposes.

OBLIGATION - The amount of an order placed, contract awarded, or service received, or any transaction which establishes a legal requirement for the ultimate disbursement of funds.

OBLIGATIONS INCURRED - Amounts of orders placed, contracts awarded, services received, and similar transactions during a given period requiring future payment of money.

PROGRAM YEAR - A concept of accounting for funds, obligations, and expenditures under a no year appropriation by identification of transactions in fiscal year segments identified by the fiscal year in which individual items were planned for obligation, without regard to the fiscal year in which the transactions were actually accomplished.

PROJECT ACCOUNT CLASSIFICATION - A subdivision of an appropriation or fund for administrative use.

UNLIQUIDATED OBLIGATION - An obligation incurred for which payment has not been made.

UNOBLIGATED BALANCE - That portion of an authorization which has not been obligated.

TRANSPORTATION

INTRODUCTION

The data included in this section represent the actual movement of people and things world-wide.

Military Airlift Command (MAC) data shown herein represent movement by the Airlift Service Industrial Fund of traffic for all services and to a minor extent for other agencies. The Airlift Service Industrial Fund began operation at the beginning of Fiscal Year 1958.

Tables reflecting movements out of AF Continental US (CONUS) installations via commercial transportation refer to traffic where movement is accomplished by a bill of lading or a transportation request. Data as shown herein include movements by Air Force for other services and do not include movements for the Air Force by other services. Data are for the period in which traffic moved rather than for the period of payment for transportation service.

DEFINITIONS

LONG TON - 2,240 pounds.

SHORT TON - 2,000 pounds (Included in MAC movement statistics).

MEASUREMENT TON (M/T) - Unit of volume displacing 40 cubic feet of space.

SPACE AVAILABLE TRAVEL - Space which is surplus after all space required traffic has been accommodated and which would otherwise be unused.

SPACE REQUIRED TRAVEL - Transportation space against which a requirement was accepted and an assignment made.
